8.2 Replacement Tree for Plaistow Green

• Tree Warden comments:

RHS suggest Magnolias or Crataegus. I am not sure about these suggestions. The Magnolia would produce lovely flowers but not necessarily in keeping with the other trees on the green.

I would not plant Crataegus as it has very spiky stems and given the proximity to the school would be inappropriate. I have spoken to them again and jointly we think the tree died due to water logging as the roots seem to have rotted.

The other website they refer us to is RHS Trees for Wet and Dry conditions which I will look at.

One question we will need to consider is how tall a tree we would like in that position. It is an exposed position and one that grows not too tall may be better.

The Planning Committee discussed with David at the Planning meeting in October which he attended (he cannot attend the Full Council Meeting). The recommendation from the tree warden is for a tree that does not extend above 30ft when mature, due to the site conditions. After various discussions as to a type of tree a Malus (Crab Apple) was thought in keeping with the area and also decorative both in the spring and autumn and most importantly would cope with the conditions. Other tree types ruled out were Birch (not good with wet conditions), Beech (grows too high), evergreen (not in keeping). Any other suggestions welcome.

Due to the wetness of the ground in the winter it was thought best to plant in early spring/late winter and to include a water gator to ensure sufficient watering as the tree grows. A rota to fill this up to be agreed. In addition, funding from CDC to be explored in the meantime.

11. Correspondence

Dear Jane

Thank you for forwarding the report of the traffic engineer. Since receiving it we have consulted various of our elected representatives, in particular Andrew Griffith MP who remains very supportive of our proposal.

We strongly disagree with the conclusions of the traffic engineer because it fails to take into account the clear guidelines set out in the West Sussex Speed Limit Policy. This requires a functional hierarchy/route assessment. A typical functional use is set out in Table 1 of 2.6 of the policy to include:

"30 mph speed limit-

Rural villages

rural "quiet ways where roads are narrow, have no footways and only a narrow verge..."

The fact is that Shillinglee precisely fits the kind of situation described. I attach photographs demonstrating that there is no footpath. There is a narrow verge in places but in other places it requires pedestrians to walk across residents' front lawns or push past hedges, and particularly at the sharp corner there is no verge at all as demonstrated in the photographs.

Over and above that, there is a lack of logic in the suggestion that speeding should be reported to the police. If there is no speed limit then the police are not involved. The report describes the residents having a "perception" of traffic speed. That is because there is traffic speed. That is why we have such substantial community support for the introduction of a speed limit.

Accordingly we should be obliged if you could again submit this matter to the Parish Council for it to approve with a strong recommendation to go to West Sussex C.C. that the issue should be fully reconsidered.
