- Which fictional detective, created by the writer Georges Simenon, has been played on TV by Rupert Davies, Richard Harris and Michael Gambon and between 2016-2017 by Rowan Atkinson in a series of TV films?
- Who starred as DI Dave Creegan in the TV series *Touching Evil*? (first name & surname required)
- What was the number of the most notorious squad car on New York's 53rd Precinct which was shown on TV between 1961-1963?
- Which cop series, shown on TV between 1977-1983, followed the exploits of police motorcyclists Baker and Poncherello?
- 7 Which early police TV drama series was based on a film called *The Blue Lamp*?
- 8 Since 1962, to the theme tune of which 1960s Police series do Everton FC always take to the field at their home matches?

Round 2 – Letter Link

This round consists of 8 general knowledge questions where the last letter of the answer to question 1 will be the same as the first letter of the answer to question 2, and the final letter of the answer to question 2 will be the same as the first letter of the answer to question 3 and so on so forth down the 8 questions. When you get to question 8, the final letter of that answer will be the same as the first letter to the answer to question 1, thus completing the link.

- Which adjective is used to describe an addictive drug which produces numbness and drowsiness?

Round 3 - Sum total

In this round all the answers are numbers and the 'sum total' of your 8 answers should be 249 (please note that all the answers are in the 40s)

- 2 Your Ruby wedding anniversary signifies how many years of wedded bliss?
- In *The Hitchiker's Guide to the Galaxy* by Douglas Adams the answer to the question about life, the universe and everything is given as which number?
- The rebellion in Scotland led by Bonnie Prince Charlie which ended with the Battle of Culloden in 1746 was nicknamed the *what*?

- With around 120 species and technically known as Corvids, by what more common name do we know this family of birds?
- 4 In chess, which is the only piece which is allowed to jump over other pieces?
- 5 Ciccone is the surname of which world wide celebrity, only ever referred to by her Christian name?
- Which famous singer was born Marie McDonald McLaughlin Lawrie on the 3rd November 1948 in Lennoxtown, Stirlingshire?
